We usually speak of the "Jewish diaspora" in terms of the scattering of the Jews from Jerusalem when the Temple was destroyed by the Romans around 70 C.E., but that community had been scattered many times before. We need to begin with the Exodus from Egypt in the 13th Century B.C.E.

After wandering in the desert, the Israelites took over the "Promised Land" of Canaan from the Canaanites. This established the homeland for Yahweh's people, from which they would be dispersed.

The first official scattering occurred when Assyria conquered the northern kingdom of divided Israel in the 8th Century. Many were taken captive and many more were forced out of Israel by the conquerors, to be gradually assimilated into Assyrian and other societies. This part of Israel was home to ten of the twelve tribes, and this is the origin of the lore of the "Lost Tribes" of Israel. The second dispersion was in the 6th Century when the southern kingdom (Judah) was conquered by Babylon. The best and brightest of Jerusalem's people were forced to live in Babylon for roughly three generations before they were allowed to return.

The 4th Century conquest of the entire region by Alexander the Great produced another dispersion. We don't have much record of this time (except in the apocryphal books of I and II Maccabees). One of the results of this conquest was the establishment of a thriving Jewish community in Alexandria, Egypt. Around 250 B.C.E. these Jews would produce a translation of the Jewish scriptures from Hebrew to Greek, known as the "Septuagint" which would provide invaluable information for future religious scholarship.

Also, not all of the Jews left prosperous Babylon to return to the impoverished ruins of Jerusalem. The Jews of Babylon became a powerful community that maintained what became the mainstream of Jewish tradition. The modern Hebrew scriptures are based most deeply on the Babylonian stream of Judaism.

Among all of these scattered communities, the traditions of worshiping Yahweh remained strong. While there was some communication among the diaspora, those traditions developed independently and began to diverge in various aspects. When the Dead Sea Scrolls were discovered in 1948, for the first time, we were able to follow the Palestinian Jewish tradition to see what their scriptural paths were like.

Enjoy reading the scriptures. They have survived a long journey to get to you!


Sunday, May 19
